 - Simplifile eRecording accepted in all Wisconsin counties and 2520 nationwide

• eSign Events

- Platform for esigning, enotary and Remote On-line Notarization (RON).
- RON approved platform in over 40 States including Wisconsin
- Can use in house notaries or contract with approved notaries for all 50 states
- Can be used alone for non-recorded documents but is integrated with eRecording for documents to easily flow through the completed execution process and recordation

<u>Land Records</u> (Tom Leslie)

Update on Personal Property (PP), which is being eliminated after 2023 with newly approved Act 12, and how that may affect Surveyors. Buildings, Fixtures and Improvements (BFI) on leased lands is now considered Real Property (RP) and will be added to the owner of the underlying land's RP tax bill in 2024. If the owner or leaser wants the leaser to receive their BFI tax bill every year, then a BFI document must be recorded at ROD. Otherwise, the owner will need to work out how their leasers are going to pay their "old PP". The BFI must be identified by a metes & bounds description, or possibly a CSM, Plat or Condo – that's where the Surveyor may play a part in this BFI process

John Schindel, 66, Green Bay, formerly Denmark, died Thursday evening, November 23, 2023. He was born July 6, 1957 in Oconto Falls to August and Irene (Heitke) Schindel. John attended Oconto Falls Public Schools where he graduated high school and later attended NWTC.

John lived most of his life in the Denmark area where he was self-employed as a surveyor. He worked for Brown County in the property mapping department, and also Watermolen Surveying. He issued land-use permits for the local township in Kewaunee County, and did volunteer work at the Wildlife Sanctuary. John loved working in the outdoors where he gardened, grew fruit trees and raised beef cattle and rabbits.

Survivors are his five siblings, Calvin Schindel; Keith (Dorene) Schindel; Grace Schindel; Diane (Harlan) Hansen; James (Cindy) Schindel; many nieces, nephews and cousins.
