



WSLS Young Surveyors Network May 2024 Report

New Business:

NSPS Student Competition



YSN was again in charge of this year's student competition and we reached our capacity of 26 teams! Different from years past there were several NSPS booths and other vendors set up during the competition near the Washington Monument for exposure. The NSPS Spring Meeting and Student Competition took place April 21-26, 2024 in Arlington, VA. The field exercises consisted of a triangulation exercise which used the Washington Monument as a back site, a level loop with significant elevation change and a four sided traverse. The monument hunt was just as big of a hit as when YSN started it in 2022. The monument hunt portion of the competition is now limited to 6 hours and the modes of transportation were cut to walking and city metro/bus transportation. The students are also graded on their professionalism.

The students were surprised with a surprise package for the Washington Wizards whose new limited logo representing the boundary stone monumenting the original corners of the District of Columbia.



The students and YSN mentors were presented with a t-shirt with this logo. A couple lucky winners of various games and SURVEYORS JEOPARDY (hosted by Gary Kent) were presented with other gear including hats and a fight over lego boundary stone sets.

This year's first place winners in the Associate Degree division was Dunwoody College of Technology of Minnesota and the Bachelorette Division winner was the University of Akron, Ohio. Congratulations to all students that participated.

YSN Meeting

During this year's YSN meeting following the competition, YSN discussed what went well and what still could use some improvement. There were 32 YSN's from around the county including the new additions of Montana, Arizona and South Carolina. There was discussion of having some sort of YSN conference piggybacking off of another conference geared more towards techs and young professionals. Not all states offer as many opportunities as Wisconsin does at our institute geared towards young professionals. Wisconsin was well represented at this conference by Megan Theune-Baillargeon, Sam Hearn and Connor Christopherson.

During the YSN meeting we were given the opportunity of hearing a presentation about the International Boundary Commission from Kevin Bagwell, a 20 year veteran. This presentation was extremely interesting and could be a potential speaker for our institute. He spoke of the long process of monument replacement, the standoffs encountered with Canada and crazy stories that have happened throughout the years. We were all engaged and could not stop asking him questions.

Following the meeting, YSN were surprised with a private tour of our nation's Capital, an experience that none of us will ever forget.

Detailed Summary

Legislation

Priority

- ★ AB-962/SB-893: Reclassification of land surveyors for purposes of worker's compensation insurance.did not pass, WSLS supported
 - This bill directs the Office of the Commissioner of Insurance to direct the Wisconsin Compensation Rating Bureau to reclassify land surveyors from class code 8602 to class code 8601 for purposes of worker's compensation insurance.
- ★ Diggers Hotline Issue- Wisconsin Damage Prevention Council
 - WSLS Executive Director, Bob Welch and WSLS Past President, Kevin Boyer, have been appointed by Diggers Hotline to the Wisconsin Damage Prevention Council. The Council is made up of stakeholders from all points of view on the issue of underground location.
- ★ Elimination of the Personal Property Tax
 - Wisconsin Act 12, the Shared Revenue bill, which provides one-fifth of the state's sales tax revenue to local counties and municipalities, also eliminated Wisconsin's Personal Property Tax. However, the legislature decided to continue taxing buildings and improvements such as cell towers and mobile homes parked at campgrounds as real estate. This creates a problem because those buildings and improvements are not owned by the underlying owner of the parcel. WSLS will be involved in trying to find a solution.
- ★ AB-135/SB-135 Reciprocal Credentials- did not pass, WSLS opposed
 - This bill creates a process for certain individuals who hold a license, certification, registration, or permit granted by another state to apply for and receive a reciprocal credential in this state.
 - Our Senate Amendment Adopted
- ★ AB-204/SB-193: Renewal dates and continuing education requirements for certain credentials issued by the Department of Safety and Professional Services and credentialing boards and granting rule-making authority. Vetoed by Governor in Special Session Senate Bill 1, WSLS opposed
 - The bill revises each two-year renewal period in the health and business professions to four-year renewal periods. Where specified in the statutes, the bill doubles the corresponding credential's continuing education requirement.
 - Amendment added- keeps CEUs at every two years
- ★ AB-205/SB-194: Practice of certain professions by credential holders from other states.- Vetoed by Governor in Special Session Senate Bill 1, WSLS opposed
 - The bill expands the temporary state credential process from health care providers to also include persons classified in the business professions with credentials in good standing in another state. The bill revises the terminology for all health care and business professions to a "preliminary" credential. If an individual with a valid credential from another state applies for a preliminary credential the individual may provide health care or business services for an employer, under the preliminary credential, while an application for a permanent credential is pending. While providing services under the preliminary credential, the person is subject to all responsibilities and limitations of the applicable state-issued credential.
 - Amendment Adopted to remove land surveyors

• This bill prohibits the enforcement of any provision in a contract between the state or a political subdivision and a private entity that is engaged in design professional services that requires the private entity to indemnify or defend the state or a political subdivision.

Act 16 (AB-266/SB-296) Judicial review of local governmental decisions related to certain land development, local approval of residential housing development, and amendment of zoning ordinances.

This Act requires political subdivisions to approve certain permit applications related to residential
housing developments that are consistent with certain local requirements and limits the authority of a
political subdivision to impose a supermajority requirement for a zoning ordinance amendment. The Act
also specifies procedures that apply to judicial review of certain local determinations related to land
use.

Act 46 (AB-275/SB-270) Damages claims relating to delayed relocation of utilities in a highway right-of-way and modifying administrative rules promulgated by the Department of Transportation.

• This bill creates a process for a highway improvement contractor to seek damages for project delays that are the result of an uncompleted relocation or adjustment of a utility facility located in the right-of-way of the highway. "Utility facility" means any pipe, pipeline, duct, wire line, conduit, pole, tower, equipment, or other structure used for transmission, distribution, or delivery of electrical power, light, heat, water, gas, sewer, telegraph, or telecommunication services.

Act 157 (AB 422/SB 413): Authority of the Department of Transportation with regard to highway setback requirements.

- This bill limits the authority of the Department of Transportation with regard to any highway setback requirements maintained by DOT. In particular, under the bill, the authority of DOT is limited in the following ways:
 - 1. A setback area regulated by DOT may not extend more than 50 feet from the nearest edge of the right-of-way of the highway.
 - 2. Any setback requirements imposed by DOT may regulate only structures that adversely affect the safety of entrance upon or departure from state trunk or connecting highways or the preservation of public interest and investment in those highways.
 - 3. DOT must provide a procedure by which a person affected by setback requirements may request a variance to a requirement.





4. DOT must provide accurate and current information about its setback requirements on its website.

Act 199 (AB-293/SB-303): Defining critical mapping data for school safety plans.

This bill uses the term "interactive critical mapping data" to describe the mapping data and defines the
term as interactive representations of a specific location that are verifiable, digital, shareable, and
shown in real time.

WSLS Followed

Act 33 (AB-203/SB-192): Renewals of certain credentials.

• The bill revises the language regarding the effect of the renewal date to specify that the renewal date is the date on which a credential expires and before which a credential holder must submit a complete renewal application in order to maintain without interruption the rights, privileges, and authority conferred by the credential. A renewal application is considered complete for purposes of satisfying the renewal requirement only when the credential holder has submitted the required fee and all forms and other documentation required for the renewal of that credential.

<u>Act 210 (AB-444/SB-439)</u>: Declaring discriminatory restrictions in instruments that affect real property void and unenforceable and allowing an owner of real property to discharge and release such a discriminatory restriction.

 This bill provides that a restriction, covenant, or condition that prohibits or restricts the ownership, transfer, encumbrance, rental, occupancy, or use of real property on the basis of being a member of a protected class, as defined in the open housing law, (discriminatory restriction) and that is contained in a deed or other instrument affecting real property is void and unenforceable.

Act 264 (AB 881/SB 826): Town withdrawals from county zoning and the effect of a jurisdiction change on zoning provisions.

• This bill provides a procedure for towns to withdraw from coverage of a county zoning ordinance and standardizes statutory language related to the continuing effect of zoning requirements upon a change of the authority with jurisdiction over zoning matters. Under the bill, beginning five years after the effective date of the bill, a town board in any county may withdraw the town from coverage of the county zoning ordinance and county development plan. In order to effectuate the withdrawal, the town must provide certain notices to the county clerk and must enact a town zoning ordinance, a comprehensive plan, and an official map.

Act 111 AB-253/SB-255 Public access to wetlands benefitting from the in lieu fee subprogram.

This bill eliminates the requirement that wetlands that benefit from the in lieu fee subprogram
administered by the Department of Natural Resources be open to the public. The bill also provides that,
in determining projects that benefit from the subprogram, DNR must, to the extent practicable, ensure
that there is no net loss of public access to wetlands.





Vetoed

WSLS Followed

<u>SB-160/AB-143</u>: Prohibiting statutes and rules examinations for certain professions. - Vetoed by Governor in Special Session Senate Bill 1

This bill prohibits the Department of Safety and Professional Services, the Board of Nursing, the
Medical Examining Board, the Occupational Therapists Affiliated Credentialing Board, the Pharmacy
Examining Board, and the Marriage and Family Therapy, Professional Counseling, and Social Work
Examining Board from requiring an applicant to pass a statutes and rules examination as a condition of
licensure or certification

AB 200/SB-189: Biennial report on various metrics related to the issuance of occupational credentials. - Vetoed

- The bill requires the Department of Safety and Professional Services (DSPS) to include the following information in its biennial report to the Legislature, for the time period since the prior report:
 - The number of applications for credentials received by DSPS and any credentialing board, and the number of those credentials granted and issued.
 - The lowest, highest, and median number of days from the day that an application for credential is initiated to the date that a final determination is made
 - The median number of contacts made to and received from an applicant for a credential before a final determination on the applicant's credential is issued.
 - The number of applications for credentials for which DSPS or a credentialing board requested more information.
 - The number of applications for credentials that required DSPS or a credentialing board to review an offense record.

AB-201/SB-190: Publication of credential metrics- Vetoed by Governor in Special Session Senate Bill 1

- The bill requires the Department of Safety and Professional Services (DSPS) to post and update the following information on its website each month, for each credential:
 - The median number of days from the day that all required fees for an application are submitted to the date a final determination is made.
 - o The number of applications submitted for a credential over the prior month.
 - The number of final determinations made on credential applications over the prior month, including the number of applications approved and the number of applications denied.
 - The number of applications for which more than 45 days have passed since the applicant submitted all required fees. DSPS must also report the number of those applications for which information from the applicant or a third party is pending, and those applications that are currently undergoing legal review.

AB-206/SB-195: Requiring the Department of Safety and Professional Services to post certain credential information on its website. - Vetoed by Governor in Special Session Senate Bill 1

• The bill requires the Department of Safety and Professional Services (DSPS) to determine, for each health care provider credential, whether the profession's reciprocity standard requires an examination





of the equivalence, comparability, or similarity of a prior issuing state's or territory's credentialing requirements.

Did not Pass

WSLS Supported

AB-254/SB-254: A wetland assured delineation program.

• The bill adds a wetland assured delineation program as a fourth method for delineating the boundaries of a wetland in a manner recognized by DNR. A wetland delineation prepared by an assured delineator has the same effect as a wetland identification or confirmation prepared by DNR, and a wetland delineation prepared by an assured delineator need not be confirmed by DNR. Under the bill, DNR must charge a \$1,200 annual certification fee to an assured delineator, must require a report of each wetland delineation an assured delineator prepares, and may charge a filing fee not to exceed \$20 for each report submitted.

AB 621/SB 389: Temporary limited easements for construction crane booms that pass over adjacent real property.

This bill provides that an owner of real property on which construction activities are occurring has a
temporary limited easement over adjacent real property that allows passing a crane boom over the
property at such an altitude so as to not interfere with the then existing use to which the property, or the
space over the property, is put by the owner.

SB-045/AB-042: Selection of architects and engineers for state projects.

This bill prohibits a committee under DOA for construction projects from refusing to select an architect
or engineer who operates an architect and engineering firm with only one responsible architect or
engineer for a construction project that has an estimated cost of less than \$2,000,000. The bill also
allows DOA to increase this threshold up to \$7,400,000.

WSLS Followed

SB-320/AB-332: Reciprocal Credentials.

• This bill expands provisions allowing individuals who hold a license, certification, registration, or permit that was granted by another state to apply for and receive a reciprocal credential in Wisconsin.

AB 768/ SB 691: Water and sewerage system connections and annexation of territory and extraterritorial zoning in certain towns.

This bill allows certain towns to designate themselves as "urban towns," a designation that would limit
the effect of extraterritorial zoning and plat approval and annexation by other municipalities. The bill
also requires local governments to allow connection, with certain limited exceptions, to their water or
sewerage systems by certain other local governments.

<u>AB-134/SB-137</u>: Preferences for woman-owned businesses in state procurement for architectural and engineering services.

 Under this bill, the Department of Administration must attempt to ensure that it pays certified woman-owned businesses 5 percent of the total amount expended for architectural and engineering





services in each fiscal year, which is identical to the requirement for minority-owned businesses under current law.

<u>AB 915/SB 872:</u> Fees for recording and filing instruments with the registers of deeds; the portion of such fees used for the land information program; and the minimum state grant amounts under the program.

This bill increases the general recording and filing fees charged by county registers of deeds, increases
the amount of the fees that counties must submit to the Department of Administration for the land
information program, and increases the minimum grant amount DOA may award to counties for
education and training grants under the program.

AB 277/SB 274: The amount and distribution of the real estate transfer fee.

 This bill decreases the real estate transfer fee from 30 cents to 20 cents for each \$100 of the value of the conveyance. Under the bill, the county retains 30 percent of the fees collected in 2023 and 2024, 40 percent of the fees collected in 2025, and 50 percent of the fees collected in 2026 and each year thereafter

WSLS Opposed- Now dead

LRB-0335: The fee charged for recording a correction instrument.

This bill provides that the register of deeds may not charge a fee for recording a correction instrument.
 Under current law, a correction instrument is a document recorded with the register of deeds that corrects a previously recorded instrument conveying real property.



Joseph William Lett Jr., 56, died unexpectedly of a heart attack at home on May 29th, 2024.


